## **My New Diveyak!!!!**

For those of you who don't know what a Diveyak is, which is most likely all of you except for the few who made it to the last e-board meeting, a Diveyak is an inflatable kayak specifically designed for diving, it is a sit-on-top kayak and has about 20 D-rings all over the boat to secure gear.

The Diveyak weighs about 51 lbs, a little heavy and bulky for one small person to carry alone, but I manage. The first time I tried it out, I went to Mashapaug after work intending to take advantage of one of the few sunny days this summer. I used the foot pump that came with it. A cheezy little piece of \*@&^%!, with a hose about as cheap as a bendy straw. What can you expect from something that's free? It took me about 50 min. to fill, partly because the air hose kept popping out of both the pump and the boat valves, and I found out later I didn't actually fill it completely (it needs to be completely filled). During that 50 min. I muttered words some of you might be surprised I know. But enough about my vocabulary.

As it took me so long to fill, and as sunset was only an hour away, I decided not to dive with it at that time, but just paddle around and get used to it. Since it was partially unfilled, it tended to list on the side that was less filled. I also found the backrest wouldn't stay in place because there was not enough tension in the sides to keep it in place. Muscles in my legs, stomach and back, that wouldn't have been used had it been completely filled, got stressed. Also, maybe it's because I'm only 5'1" with a short torso, but I found that the paddle and my hands kept hitting the d-rings and the sides of the boat unless I made a concentrated effort not to do so. Maybe I just should get an extra long paddle, as I understand extra long torsos are way too expensive for my budget.

That being said. It is very easy to get into and out of. The second time I used it was after the eboard meeting. Kevin took a look at it and very thoughtfully and generously filled it with his compressor in minutes. It was great. The only drawback to having an inflated kayak in the car was that it was nearly impossible to back out of anywhere without help, but I managed that too. I was thrilled to have a completely filled kayak. The backrest stayed in place. I was completely comfortable sitting in it and paddling it. The front didn't tip up, so I had a completely clear view of where I was going. I didn't use any extra muscles. Before I bought this kayak, I had never kayaked before or rowed any type of boat or canoe. I had a great time gliding along the lake. Although, my hands, being unused to manual labor (aren't I dainty), were a little tender after all that paddling, but not so much that blisters formed or that I wouldn't do it again the next day i.

thunderstorms weren't in the forecast.

I performed two diving tests that day. The first test, I anchored the kayak in a shallow area, geared up, and went diving. Putting on my bcd was a little awkward as this was the first time I didn't have a solid surface to rest it on, but I managed it. The second test, I attached a line to the kayak and to myself. The kayak followed me wherever I went. I swam into water that was above my head, took my gear off in the water and put it in and/or attached it to the kayak. I got back into the kayak very easily, without tipping it, and with hardly any effort, then pulled my bcd and tank aboard and secured my gear.

On another day, I performed two more tests. 1) Gearing up in water above my head and 2) switching out tanks. Both tasks were slightly awkward, but both were manageable.

I am very happy with my new dive boat. Now I don't have to hike that long trail at Mashapaug to go diving. I can go dive off any public boat launch, and when I'm done, I can let the air out, fold up my boat, put it in the trunk and go home. Yipeee!!

## *Things I learned diving on vacation*

We did two weeks of sailing cruises this summer and learned a few things about diving off of a sailboat.

**Dive 1:** Trying to recover some pirate booty lost in the mooring field, with strong current.

**Lesson one:** Some mooring fields are much deeper than others! This one was 38 feet deep. This actually required a safety stop, unlike the 6 foot deep slip where I keep my boat, and the 10-15 feet of many anchorages. This was not a surprise, since we have a depth gauge on the boat. But it made our dive a more serious dive, rather than one in which we can pop up to get our bearings, at will, with no consequences.

**Lesson two:** Between the strong current, relatively poor visibility, and a little difficulty equalizing while descending, we lost track of our position early in the dive, but didn't realize it until much later. *Next time we will attach a line to the boat, with a length as long as the depth plus the radius of area that we'd like to search. So maybe 38 plus 20 or 30 more feet, with a weight of some sort to hold the vertical portion directly below the boat. Then we can do radial searches with the remaining 20-30 feet.*

**Lesson three:** It's great to have "shore support" on the boat. With the line that we should have had, we wouldn't have strayed far from the boat, and could have used the line to move ourselves closer to the boat once we surfaced. Instead, to get back to the boat, we swam quite a distance against the current and got pretty tired. Fortunately, our shore support team not only tossed us a line, but also reeled us in. Thank you!

**Lesson four:** When swimming against a strong current, we were later advised by a wise dive master, do the tired diver tow right from the start. Switch off who tows who, but the point is one water column of resistance is better than two.

**Lesson five:** It's great to have "shore support" on the boat. It's hard to climb a tiny moving ladder in full dive gear. It's great to be able to hand things up to others. Rule of thumb: Hand over weights first, fins last.

**Lesson six:** It's not easy to find lost stuff, especially after a couple of years. Don't expect too much and enjoy the dive. We saw lots of starfish and the claw of an enormous lobster (the rest of him was hiding under a rock). In fact, he gets bigger every time we retell this story.

**Dive 2:** While trying to leave a mooring, we wrapped a mooring line around the prop of the boat.

**Lesson one:** To unwrap the line, use the following procedure.

Secure the boat to the chain (under the mooring ball) with another line. With at least one person on the boat and one (plus buddy) in the water, tie a strong dock

1. line to one boat cleat, run it through the chain (no knot!), and secure it to another boat cleat. This creates a temporary harness that can be released from the boat without having to go back in the water.
2. Take the load off of the original mooring line by pulling up slightly on the temporary harness, and securing it to the boat. This takes the load off of the line that is wrapped around the prop shaft. You will not be able to unwrap it if it has load.
3. Keep hands away from those prop blades. It shouldn't turn on its own, but you don't want to be the one to test this.

Once the mooring line is unwrapped, shore support can retrieve the original mooring line (and re-attach it to the boat, so the boat doesn't float away from those divers still in the water!) and remove the temporary harness. In our case we had to replace the mooring line on the bow cleat, so the Harbor Master could inspect it to verify that it wasn't damaged.

Lesson two: While down there, take the opportunity to check, secure, or replace the zincs as needed. Also consider checking raw water intakes for any obstructions such as plastic bags or jellyfish.

Lesson three: To avoid this happening in the first place, the helms person and line releaser need to communicate, "Ready? Ready! Go!" And always back away or float back from the mooring until it is well clear of the boat.

Lesson four: Always carry working dive gear on board, including a dive flag, and tanks with at least a little gas left. We figure that we saved somewhere between \$250 and \$1000 by being able to do this operation ourselves, with no damage to the mooring or boat. \$1000 buys a lot of dive gear!

3. Future Dive: Our next planned adventure will be to retrieve an anchor lost by a neighboring boater. One lesson that I read recently is that a storm (Hello, Hurricane Bill???) can either cover or uncover treasures, as the waves move objects and sand. So, to me this means, "Be persistent!" It might not be ex-
